# **BIUST, NPC HOST VISION 2036 PUBLIC LECTURE**

The Botswana University of Science and Technology (BIUST), in conjunction with the National Planning Commission (NPC), hosted the inaugural Vision 2036 Public Lecture. The remarkable event was held at BIUST in Palapye.

The lecture, held under the theme "The Case of BIUST: Transitional Development Plan (TNDP) - Contribution Towards Innovation and Digital Transformation", marked a significant milestone in fostering innovation and digital transformation in Botswana.

Professor Otlogetswe Totolo, Vice Chancellor of BIUST, welcomed the distinguished guests and attendees, emphasizing the university's commitment to producing scientists, technologists, and engineers. He expressed gratitude on behalf of BIUST for being selected to host the public lecture, highlighting the university's role in transforming Botswana's economy through research, innovation, and technology. Professor Totolo acknowledged the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the adoption of technology and digital transformation. He emphasized BIUST's dedication to addressing societal challenges, particularly during the era of the 4th Industrial Revolution.

BIUST's achievements in digital transformation were underscored, including the BOTSAT 1 Ground communication station and the upcoming BOTSAT1 satellite project, spanning various academic fields. In conclusion, Professor Totolo invited all the guests to join BIUST in celebrating its 10th Anniversary, which will include a week of activities culminating in the Graduation ceremony on September 22, 2023.

In his opening remarks, Honourable Onneetse Ramogapi, Member of Parliament for the Palapye constituency, emphasized the timeliness and relevance of the lecture. He noted that the theme was well-suited to stimulate critical debates among academics, government officials, researchers, and the public. Honourable Ramogapi stressed the importance of innovation and digital technology in addressing the challenges posed by climate change, especially in a country prone to droughts.

The highlight of the lecture was the discussion surrounding BIUST's role in the development of the Transitional Development Plan (TNDP). Honourable Ramogapi praised BIUST for its involvement in satellite design and management, which could provide valuable data for farmers to enhance food production. Additionally, he acknowledged the significance of BIUST-developed drones, emphasizing their potential impact on the health sector.

The Palapye legislator called for all educational institutions to align their initiatives with the government's Mind-Set Change initiative, emphasizing a need for collaboration in achieving national goals.

Addressing the audience, Honourable Kabo N.S. Morwaeng, Minister for State President, described the lecture as the first of its kind on Vision 2036. He highlighted the theme's focus on using science, technology and innovation to drive the economy and commended BIUST's role in supporting this vision. Minister Morwaeng challenged BIUST to accelerate its efforts in research, innovation, and creativity to contribute to the achievement of the TNDP.

Minister Morwaeng announced that the lecture marked the beginning of the annual Vision 2036 commemorative events, aiming to update the nation on progress and challenges. He emphasized BIUST's pivotal role in achieving high-income status through a diversified, knowledge-based economy.

Acknowledging BIUST's achievements, Minister Morwaeng recognized the university's significant contributions to industry growth and development. He lauded BIUST for producing industrious students whose impact is felt globally.

The event concluded with a panel discussion moderated by Professor Patricia Makepe, Director of the Center for Business Management, Entrepreneurship, and General Education at BIUST. The panellists included Mr. Diane Mongudi, Acting Chief Executive Officer of Botswana Innovation Hub; Prof Joseph Chuma, Dean Faculty of Engineering at BIUST; Mr. Mpho Koolese, Technical Executive at Botswana Fibre Networks; and Ms. Marang Mbaakanyi, Chief Executive Officer of Drones for Africa and a BIUST alumna.

The Vision 2036 Public Lecture marked a significant step in aligning national goals with innovation, technology, and the role of BIUST in shaping Botswana's future.



In a display of continued commitment to fostering strategic collaborations and advancing their shared mission, BIUST welcomed the recently appointed Central CUT Vice-Chancellor, Professor Pamela Dube, and her delegation on a courtesy call. The visit served as a reaffirmation of the strong partnership established between the two institutions through a Memorandum of Understanding in 2019. BIUST's Vice-Chancellor, Professor Otlogetswe Totolo, began the meeting by congratulating Professor Dube on her historic appointment as the first female Vice-Chancellor of CUT. He acknowledged that both universities, being STEM-focused, hold a significant responsibility in driving economic and social transformation in their respective countries. The meeting provided an ideal platform to explore avenues for collaboration that can yield fruitful results. the importance of serving Hiahliahtina the communities they operate within, Professor Totolo stressed that joint activities between CUT and BIUST should aim to forge cross-border business and cultural ties. benefiting both individuals and government relations. He emphasized the need for universities to continuously evolve their academic delivery methods to remain relevant and impactful in today's dynamic world. "The trend in universities is moving towards partnerships that leverage on complementary strengths," Professor Totolo said. He expressed the importance of close collaboration between the two institutions to optimize the use of limited resources, fostering a culture of success in research, teaching, and learning. Professor Totolo believed that as institutions of higher learning, CUT and BIUST are well-positioned to lead the economic development agenda of the Southern African Development Community (SADC) and Africa as a whole, harnessing their research talents and academic output to drive progress.

The ongoing partnership between CUT and BIUST exemplifies the power of collaboration in driving economic and social progress. By leveraging their complementary strengths and shared vision, both institutions are poised to play pivotal roles in the development of a knowledge-based economy and society, not only in their respective countries but across the SADC region and the continent.

Professor Dube commended BIUST for their rapid successes and acknowledged the mutual understanding the institutions share regarding the importance global engagement and of а student-centric approach. She encouraged BIUST to not only focus on research and technology but also prioritize campus life and staff welfare, ensuring a and supportive environment for holistic all stakeholders.

Let us self-introspect, for one to reach their goal they should focus and set clear objectives and actively work towards them. By taking small steps each day, you can create lasting changes that will have a positive impact on the attainment of your goal. These small steps are what we can call a structure, a road map that will take you to your destination. This is how you place, organize, and coordinate all the elements you need to achieve your goal. The following is an ideal structure for reporting lines and independence in BIUST.



Standard 1100- Independence and Objectivity, states that the internal audit function must be independent, and internal auditors must be objective in performing their work. The BIUST IAF achieves its independence through the following;

i) Dual reporting, administratively to the Vice Chancellor (VC) and functionally to the audit committee and/or directly to the Council.

ii) Use of the Internal Audit Charter approved by the Audit Committee.

iii) Operating with a risk-based internal audit plan approved by the Audit Committee.

iv) Internal audit budget and resource plan approved by the Audit Committee.

v) The function's assessment on performance relative to its plans.

vi) The Council's responsibility to appoint, remove and approve remuneration of the Director of the Internal Audit and Risk. Internal Audit Function interacts with Management and other Directorates to develop business and operational understanding, leveraging their expertise to bridge silos within the institution. The Director assesses the operational design, business processes, technological advancements, control environment, and maturity of other assurance providers within the institution.

This assessment helps align the IAF resources and strategic plan with the overall institutional strategy, technologies, budgets, external consultants, and potential consultancy engagements in the future. This interaction is visible through important meetings such as the Management Audit and Risk Committee (MARC) meeting, facilitation of the audit needs analysis to enable the formulation of the annual risk-based audit plan and through the engagement audit process.
